Harry Phillips is a native San Diegian, whose father taught him to appreciate plants at an early age. In January of 1963, Harry's younger brother, Andy (of Andy's Orchids fame), was born and six years later is when it all started. They were both exposed to exotic plants and flowers at an

early age, but when Andy became interested and, later, obsessed with orchids, Harry somehow resisted becoming involved with them for as long as he could. He assisted Andy in his passion by building his first two greenhouses and Andy would reward him with a hybrid that was in bloom, tell him to bring it back when it goes out of bloom, and exchange it for one in bloom. Well, this would only last about a year until Harry decided that he wanted to keep one and get it to rebloom, the beginning of the end.

In 1986, Harry, with his soon to be wife, Leslie, moved with Andy and his orchid collection to Encinitas, California. Being

This is an ideal time to repot orchids in order to give them a head start on the upcoming growing season. The "April To Do" list has some helpful information on repotting various genera. Also the flurry of Spring Orchid Shows and sales has generated renewed enthusiasm for all orchid and plant lovers to supplement their collections and to attend to their plant's increasing needs.

Our POS Display committee, headed by Helge Weissig did an excellent job in putting together an impressive display for the recent San Diego Orchid Society Show at the Scottish Rite Center. Unfortunately, our display did not receive an award this year as the competition was quite stiff with many other great displays receiving awards, including our sister society, The San Diego County Cymbidium Society. They had a very nice exhibit which won the "Best Exhibit Illustrating the Show's Theme". Several other POS members received awards for displays and Best of Section for individual plant submissions, including Jerry and Anita Spencer (Best Amateur Exhibit), Renate Schmidt (Best Colored Cattleya Alliance, Best Miniature Cattleya and Best 3 Cattleyas in a Container) and myself. Particularly satisfying to me was the Best of Section obtained for my Zygopetalum Fair Maiden, a hybrid made by Loren Batchman to whom the show was dedicated. Congratulations to all winners and participants in making the San Diego show a great success.

Members and guests will not want to miss our exciting speaker this month, Harry Phillips of Andy's Orchids fame. April To Do List

General

- Review and continue to follow recommendations for March since continued cool temperatures throughout March, particularly on the coast, has delayed Spring flowering and onset of growth for some species and hybrids.
- Fine tune the shading of orchids as heat and light continue to increase.



- If not done yet, spray benches and growing areas with Physan to decrease possibility of bacterial and fungal diseases.
- April brings on new growth for many orchids and the opportunity to repot and divide those orchids that initiate new root growth at this time. Try to repot when roots are small and just beginning to emerge in order to minimize damage to soft tissues and avoid transplant shock, giving plants a head start for the upcoming growing season.
- Repot when orchids have begun to over grow their pots and/or when media has started to break down. Also consider repotting plants that have been in pots for 2 or more years and are existing, but not thriving. Repotting can revitalize and provide new vigor to such plants.
- It is desirable to thoroughly rinse and soak all media prior to potting. Dry media tends to wick moisture away from plants. Then keep plants relatively dry to encourage root growth. If you prefer to repot using dry bark mixes, water newly potted plants thoroughly (2-3x), then keep on dry side to stimulate root growth.
- To divide orchids, allow for 3-5 bulbs per division.
- Check plants for algae, as a crust of algae acts as a barrier to both water and

constantly exposed to all of Andy's orchids was beginning to have an effect on Harry. Shortly after, Andy left for four months to Costa Rica, and placed Harry in charge of the collection. When Andy returned he found that Harry had not killed too many plants and managed to become even more addicted. Andy, now feeling more confident about leaving his orchid collection under Harry's care, began to plan a cycling trip through South America, which ended up lasting two years. After that it was all over for Harry, he was completely addicted to orchids.



Harry assisted Andy part time, with the beginnings of Andy's Orchids for 10 years, while holding a full time job to pay the mortgage, going full time at the nursery about 12 years ago. He is usually the one who attends the shows, taking their well-known Wardian cases with them. Harry's passion in orchids are in the genera Sobralia and Elleanthus, but you ask him at any particular time of the year which is his favorite orchid, it will most likely be the one or ones in bloom at that time. He has traveled in Mexico, the Caribbean, and Ecuador viewing orchids in the wild. Harry believes that growing epiphytic orchids the way they grow in nature is best and the orchids seem to agree.

fertilizer, thus preventing roots from breathing properly.

- Cautiously use any pesticide, fungicide or chemical keeping in mind that most manufacturers typically do not specify the use of their products on orchids. Always use the lowest prescribed dose and avoid spraying flowers and buds. Recommended dosing for orchids can sometimes be found on the manufacturer's website or on various orchid forums (such as The Orchid Source).
- Orchids that are in bloom require less water, which allows the flowers to last longer.

Indoors and Greenhouse

 Monitor for pests and diseases as temperatures begin to rise. Make sure fans and coolers are in good working order.

- Provide good air circulation for indoor plants to discourage diseases and pests such as mealy bugs. Treat early to avoid spreading to other plants.
- April is a good time to repot Paphiopedilums, which tend to benefit from a yearly repotting. Most do well in small bark and perlite containing a little charcoal. It is a good time to check the roots.



Outdoors

- Continue to monitor and control snails and slugs as weather warms. They can do considerable damage to new growths, buds and flowers in short order.
- Cattleyas, Oncidiums, Cymbidiums, and Aussie Dendrobiums should begin

Judging Sessions

The Pacific South Judging Center conducts each month three judging sessions in the Los Angeles and San Diego area. Locally, the sessions are held in Balboa Park, Casa del Prado in room 104 on the 1st Tuesday of the month at 6 pm.

initiating new root and bulb growth. Increase watering frequency and fertilizer as new growth is observed and repot as needed.

- Australian Dendrobiums are in full bloom now. Dividing and repotting can be done after flowering is complete and new roots begin to form. Dendrobiums like to be root bound so only repot when plants outgrow their pots or are not doing well. Leave room for 2 or 3 years growth.
- In addition to Cymbidiums, Zyopetalums should be flowering and be ready to divide and/or repot once flowers wilt. Treat Zygos in the same manner as Cymbidiums and repot accordingly: repotting instructions at <u>Casa de las</u> <u>Orchideas (http://www.orquideas.co</u> <u>m/growing/potting/cymbpot.html)</u> and <u>The Mulch</u> (http://www.themulch.com/orchids/ <u>cymbidium-orchids-care-in-southern-c</u> <u>alifornia</u>).
