General Meeting Information

The Palomar Orchid Society regularly meets the FIRST WEDNESDAY of every month at the Pavilion at Lake San Marcos (1105 La Bonita Dr., San Marcos, CA 92078).

Traveling on State Route 78, take the Rancho Santa Fe exit and head South. The entrance to

POS Members Receive Multiple Awards at the SDCOS Show & Sale

The San Diego Orchid Societies Spring Show & Sale was a big success and many of our POS members received multiple awards and ribbons at the show. Most significantly, Anita and Jerry Spencer won the Sweepstakes Trophy for Best Orchid in the Show with their fantastic specimen plant of Ctt. (Lc.) Trick or Treat 'Rainbow Valley'. Moreover, this plant won the Thorne Trophy for Best Colored Cattleya Alliance in the Show, Best of Section 401 for Standard Cattleya Alliance as well as first place and cultural ribbons. Way to go Spencers!!!

Jerry and Anita's cymbidiums also received two trophies. The Spencer's pendulous cymbidium, Cym. Len Southward X Cym. Pepperpuss, won the Abernathy Trophy for Best Cymbidium (Amateur), Best of Section 301 and multiple ribbons. Moreover, their Cym. Doctor Len 'Geyserland' (all 3) was awarded the Foster Trophy for Best 3 Cymbidiums in Containers Not in a Massed Display (Amateur), Best of Section 333.01 plus multiple ribbons.

Phyllis Prestia was awarded the Peterson Trophy (Amateur) for Best 3 Cattleyas in Containers Not in a Massed Display as well as Best of Section 666.01 (Amateur) and a first place ribbon. She also won the Moore Trophy for Best White or Semi-alba Standard Cattleya and a first place ribbon for her namesake, Cattleya Phyllis Prestia AM/AOS.

Renate Schmidt won Best of Section1001B (Amateur) for Renantheria imschotiana and Best of Section 666.01 (Open) for 3 Cattleyas in Container Not in a Massed Display.

In addition, our sister society, the San Diego County Cymbidium Society, received the Jim Wright Trophy

The exhibit was a great success and we received multiple compliments on the display from attendees and other participants. Our display won two trophies, The President's Trophy (Open) and the Balboa Trophy (Amateur), both for the best display depicting the show theme. Each trophy comes with a \$100 award.

Again, congratulations and sincere thanks to all who participated in the display. Finally, thanks to Gus, Rosita and their dog, Pedro, for the long hours spent posing in the display.

Cymbidium Culture Sheet

These orchids are prized for their long-lasting sprays of flowers, used especially as cut flowers or for





corsages in the spring. There are two main types of cymbidiums - standards and miniatures. Where summer nights are warm (above 70 F), only miniatures can be recommended, because manyare more tolerant of heat and able to flower in warmer weather.

Light is important for growing cymbidiums. Coming from cool and bright areas in Asia, they need high light but cool temperatures. In many southern climates, high summer temperatures, especially at night, may prevent the plants from blooming. The maximum amount of light possible, short of burning, should be given to the plants. This means only light shade during the middle of the day, or about 20 percent shade. In cool areas (such as coastal California), full sun is tolerated. Leaves should be a medium to golden green in color, not dark green.

Temperatures are another critical factor in flowering standard and miniature cymbidiums. During the summer, standard cymbidiums are usually grown outside in semishade, where day temperatures should be 75 to 85 F (or more), but night

temperatures in the late summer to autumn (August to October) must be 50 to 60 F to initiate flower spikes. Optimum temperatures in winter are 45 to 55 F at night and 65 to 75 F during the day. When plants are in bud, temperatures must be as constant as possible, between 55 and 75 F. Miniatures can stand temperatures five to 10 degrees higher than standards and still flower. Most cymbidiums can tolerate light frosts and survive, but this is not recommended. Bring them inside when temperatures dip to 40 F. In mild climates, they can be grown outside year round. A bright and cool location inside is best for winter months.

Water to provide a constant supply of moisture to cymbidiums, which are semiterrestrial plants. They generally produce all their vegetative growth during the spring and summer and need the most water during that period. Water heavily during the growth season, keeping the potting material evenly moist. Reduce water when the pseudobulbs complete growing in late summer. Keep barely moist during the winter.

Caravan and Re-potting Party at Anita and Jerry Spencer's Home

Please hold the date of Saturday, June **10**, for a caravan to Anita and Jerry Spencer's home. We will conduct a re-potting demo and party where members will be able to re-pot some of their plants with the help of more



experienced members. In addition, there will be a pot luck lunch and attendees will be able to view all of the Spencer's lovely plants and, hopefully, purchase some as well. Caravan details are in progress so watch for more information in the May newsletter.

Cymbidium Culture cont.

Humidity outdoors is usually sufficient during the summer, except in dry climates, where evaporative cooling in a greenhouse is necessary. Keep humidity at 40 to 60 percent during the winter, especially if plants are in bud. Keep the air moving to prevent fungus (Botrytis) from spotting the flowers.

Fertilize at the proper time to help cymbidiums flower. During the growth season (spring through late summer), high nitrogen fertilizer (such as 30-10-10) is used. In late summer, use a high-phosphorus, blossom-booster fertilizer (such as 10-30-20), to help form bloom spikes. Fertilize at full strength every week to two weeks. In winter, fertilize once a month.

Potting is usually done in the spring after flowering, usually every two years or when the potting medium decomposes. Shake all of the old potting mix off the roots, dividing the plant if desired. Pick a water-retentive potting mix; medium-grade fir bark with peat moss and perlite is a common mix. Select a pot that will allow for at least two to three years of pseudobulb growth before crowding the pot, while planning on placing the active growing pseudobulb(s) of the division farthest from the side of the pot. Spread the roots over a cone of the mix in the bottom of the pot and fill the container with medium, working it among the roots, tamping firmly. Single backbulbs need not even be placed in mix until new growth and roots are noted. Keep shaded and warm until new growth sprouts, and pot as above.

April To-Do List

General

Review and continue to follow recommendations for March since continued cool temperatures throughout March, particularly on the coast, has delayed Spring flowering and onset of growth for some species and hybrids.

Fine tune the shading of orchids as heat and light continue to increase.

If not done yet, spray benches and growing areas with Physan to decrease possibility of bacterial and fungal diseases.

April brings on new growth for many orchids and the opportunity to repot and divide those orchids that initiate new root growth at this time. Try to repot when roots are small and just beginning to emerge in order to minimize damage to soft tissues and avoid transplant shock, giving plants a head start for the upcoming growing season.

Repot when orchids have begun to over grow their pots and/or when media has started to break down. Also consider repotting plants that have been in pots for 2 or more years and are existing, but not thriving. Repotting can revitalize and provide new vigor to such plants.

It is desirable to thoroughly rinse and soak all media prior to potting. Dry media tends to wick moisture away from plants. Then keep plants relatively dry to encourage root growth. If you prefer to repot using dry bark mixes, water newly potted plants thoroughly (2-3x), then keep on dry side to stimulate root growth.

To divide orchids, allow for 3-5 bulbs per division.

Check plants for algae, as a crust of algae acts as a barrier to both water and fertilizer, thus preventing roots from breathing properly.

Cautiously use any pesticide, fungicide or chemical keeping in mind that most manufacturers typically do not specify the use of their products on orchids. Always use the lowest prescribed dose and avoid spraying flowers and buds. Recommended dosing for orchids can sometimes be found on the manufacturer's website or on various orchid forums (such as <u>The Orchid Source</u>).

Orchids that are in bloom require less water, which allows the flowers to last longer.

Indoors and Greenhouse

Monitor for pests and diseases as temperatures begin to rise. Make sure fans and coolers are in good working order.

Provide good air circulation for indoor plants to discourage diseases and pests such as mealy bugs. Treat early to avoid spreading to other plants.

April is a good time to repot Paphiopedilums, which tend to benefit from a yearly repotting. Most do well in small bark and perlite containing a little charcoal. It is a good time to check the roots.

Outdoors

Continue to monitor and control snails and slugs as weather warms. They can do considerable damage to new growths, buds and flowers in short order.

Cattleyas, Oncidiums, Cymbidiums, and Aussie Dendrobiums should begin initiating new root and bulb growth. Increase watering frequency and fertilizer as new growth is observed and repot as needed.

Australian Dendrobiums are in full bloom now. Dividing and repotting can be done after flowering is complete and new roots begin to form. Dendrobiums like to be root bound so only repot when plants outgrow their pots or are not doing well. Leave room for 2 or 3 years growth.

In addition to Cymbidiums, Zyopetalums should be flowering and be ready to divide and/or repot once flowers wilt. Treat Zygos in the same manner as Cymbidiums.
