### Orchid Viruses: Introduction and Practical Aspects of Virus Testing

We are delighted to welcome back Dr. Kay Klausing, 1st VP of the San Diego County Orchid Society who will speak to us on orchids viruses. During his Masters and PhD work, Kay used a virus as a model system for replication and, as such, he has had a long interest in and

fascination with viruses. Kay will give a brief introduction to orchid viruses, but will focus mainly on the practical aspects from the point of growing orchids. He will give a live demo on how to perform tests, share the test results for his collection and provide tips on how to prevent the spread of virus in a collection.

Kay was born and raised in Germany, but he did not start growing orchids until he was in college. The University of Konstanz, where he got his Master and PhD in Molecular Genetics, had a lone Dendrobium kingianum specimen covering 2 huge baskets that had developed thousands of keikis due to being kept too warm. The gardener gave him a few keikis, which got him hooked on orchids. Kay moved to the US in 1990 to do a postdoc at UCSD and gave his collection to his dad who also got "infected" with the dreaded orchid virus, much to his mom's dismay.

One of the first things Kay bought in the US, before even owning a car, was an orchid at an orchid show sponsored by POS. Since then, his orchid collection has swelled to about 800 plants with an emphasis on the Cattleya alliance,

consisting of mostly species. Kay grows his plants in three greenhouses (cool, intermediate and warm) and one outdoor area for rupicolous Laelias.

The March plant table will be comprised of select cattleyas divisions given to POS by Fred Clarke as well as several hybrid Australian dendrobiums produced by Fred.

This month's speaker is Kay Klausing the 1st VP of the San Diego County Orchid Society. He will be speaking about plant viruses and how to detect them and avoid spreading them in your collection. It should be a very informative, practical and interesting talk. Virus test kits previously purchased by POS will be available for

\$5.00 each, which can be split in two to test two plants.







### General Meeting Information

The Palomar Orchid Society regularly meets the **FIRST WEDNESDAY** of every month at the <u>Pavilion at Lake San Marcos</u> (1105 La Bonita Dr., San Marcos, CA 92078).

Traveling on State Route 78, take the Rancho Santa Fe exit and head South. The entrance to

the Lake San Marcos Resort is on your left about a 1/4 mile South of the San Marcos Blvd. intersection. Traveling on I5 South from Oceanside and North Carlsbad, take the Palomar Airport exit and turn right onto Rancho Santa Fe after about 7 miles. Traveling North on I5 from South Carlsbad and Encinitas, for example, take the La Costa Ave. exit and turn left onto Rancho Santa Fe. The

entrance to the resort will be the first right after the fire station in San Marcos.

Inside the resort at the first "T" intersection, turn left on San Marino Drive. At the next 4-way STOP, turn right on La Bonita Drive. Proceed ahead for one block on La Bonita. The pavilion will be on the left and there is parking in front of the pavilion.

### Orchid Viruses

Orchids are suceptible to a variety of biotic and abiotic agents that can hinder their development and diminish the quality of their leaves and flowers. Among biotic agents, fungi, bacteria and viruses are the most important. Viruses are organisms invisible to the naked eye that can be seen only through transmission electron microscopes, which can amplify their images several thousand times.

Some 30 different viruses have been reported infecting orchids in various regions of the world. Of those, Odontoglossum ringspot virus (ORSV) and Cymbidium mosaic virus (CyMV) are considered the most important ones due to their prevalence, worldwide occurrence and the severe symptoms they can induce in several orchid genera, often reducing their vigor, lowering flower quality and leading to economic losses. Mixed infections are quite common, because these viruses have similar biological and epidemiological characteristics and are frequently transmitted together.



### **Symptoms**

The symptoms that are caused by viruses are variable and difficult to pinpoint. Sometimes, infected plants are asymptomatic, but still experience a reduction in vigor. Common symptoms on leaves of most orchid genera are irregular chlorotic or necrotic lesions of various sizes. Yellow

stripes may also occur. Circular ringspots, yellow to red lesions, with or without necrotic centers, can be observed in some hybrids. Laelia plants tend to exhibit purplish blotches on their leaves. Symptoms on Cymbidium are often mosaic with or without necrosis. Less common but observed in Phalaenopsis is the downward leaf curling. Flowers, mainly those of Cattleya and Phalaenopsis, often exhibit necrosis or color break (variations in the color of the petals). Cymbidium flowers rarely display viral symptoms.

Because of the large variability in symptoms and the possibility of infected plants' being asymptomatic, identifying orchid viruses is not an easy task. Symptoms may vary according to the plant genotype (genus, species, variety), environmental conditions (temperature, humidity), management of the plants

(level of nutrition, stress, etc.), as well as virus species and isolates. In addition, some of the symptoms associated with viruses can be also caused by other factors. For instance, flower necrosis can be caused by CyMV and by fungi such as Botrytis cinerea. In Cattleya plants, flower color break can be caused by ORSV or by drastic changes in temperature, and **ORSV-infected Cymbidium** can exhibit a mild mosaic



that resembles nutrient deficiency.

#### **Controls**

It is important to remember that there is no cure for an orchid infected with ORSV or CyMV, even though efforts have been made to produce genetically engineered resistant plants. Thus, the best way to control orchid viruses is by prevention, avoiding their entrance in the growing area. This is not easy to do, particularly when infected plants are asymptomatic. Because of that, one should always buy orchids from certified producers and avoid bringing plants with symptoms home. Special attention should be given to mother plants, which ought to be guaranteed virus-free.

If viruses are already present in the area, several measures need to be taken. Infected plants should be discarded and the suspicious ones should be isolated to prevent further dissemination of the viruses. Separating plants of different ages also helps prevent viral spread, since the older the plant is, the higher its chance of being infected. This occurs because the longer a plant stays in the production area, the more often it has been manipulated, and as it is known, ORSV and CyMV can be transmitted by handling during dividing, repotting, cutting or any other management practice.
