As you know, POS is a non-profit Society and normally we do not buy and sell orchid products for our members, such as potting mix, fertilizers, orchids, etc. We are aware of one large society in Los Angeles County that arranged for special pricing on orchid bark by placing a large order with a retail store. While POS is not large enough to obtain special pricing, we have recently made contact

with a local manufacturer of Snail Bait for special pricing (approximately 30% below retail). All of us encounter slugs and snails in our garden so if you are interested, contact Bill Wong at the June Meeting and he can coordinate a purchase on behalf of POS. Product sizes vary from 1 pound, 2 pounds, 3 pounds, 5 pounds and 25 pound bags. POS will make the purchase and pass any savings onto our members.

Please continue to refer to the AOS website and POS website for things to do for your orchids during the upcoming months. We will publish an updated May 'To Do' list in this newsletter for your convenience.

In closing, both of us hope all of our members and friends remain well, upbeat and optimistic about the future. 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## **Tips and Tricks**

#### From Ken Campbell:

I'm always on the lookout for something to make my orchid life easier, and here's something that really does just that... It's a swivel for the sprayer at the end of my watering wand. I leave it straight for most plants, and then bend it down ninety degrees to water the plants that live toward the top of my greenhouse. It's called a Swivel Hose Connector, by Melnor, and available on Amazon for about \$7. (Note added by Alex, Home Depot also offers a similar hose swivel by Swan for essentially the same price).





#### From Alex Nadzan:

For those of you who are actively repotting or dividing your orchids, sometimes it is desirable to secure a newly repotted orchid with an upright stake as show below (left) to prevent the pseudo bulbs that are producing the new, delicate roots from being damaged by wind movement. Also one can stabilize a plant in the pot by drilling two holes in the pot opposite to one another and inserting a coated metal or a wooden rod just above the rhizome to stabilize the plant until new roots take hold. This works particularly well when using shallow pots or bulb pans for L. anceps or C. intermedia and related hybrids. See the pic below (right).

# **Highlighting Interesting Orchids in Bloom**

Last month Alex highlighted his first cattleya that was in bloom at the time. Since the last few months have been the primary blooming season for cymbidiums, Alex will feature one of his favorite cymbidiums, Cym. Persian Bronze 'Barbara', that was purchased from a San **Diego County Cymbidium Society Auction** in 2015, donated by Rudvalis Orchids for the auction. Cymbidium Persian Bronze (Cym.Red Beauty x Mighty Mouse) was registered by Geyserland in 1989. The cultivar 'Barbara' was cloned by Rudvalis Orchids and used for one of their cut flower offerings, which is still available today as listed on their website. It is a beautiful large, orangish bronze colored cymbidium with several flowers per stem (see pic below). This year's blooming was not optimal as in previous years, likely due to the heavy rains this spring and it only produced one inflorescence as opposed to several in previous years.

A couple of years ago I visited Barbara Rudvalis and she mentioned to me that in the cloning process of Cym. Persian Bronze 'Barbara' she obtained a couple of mutants that were interesting and asked if I wanted to purchase divisions of them. Of course, I could not say no to her as she

has been very generous to our society in the past and I am always interested in unusual orchids. As many of you maybe aware, that cloning of an orchid sometimes produces tetraploid or other mutant progeny as a result of the cloning process and, in this case, cloning produced at least two interesting mutants, Cymbidium Persian Bronze 'Barbara' (mutant) and Cymbidium Persian Bronze 'Carmen", as highlighted below. I find them intriguing and hope that you do too. I'm definitely planning to keep both of them and grow them out to more mature plants. Perhaps I will have a few divisions to donate to our auction next year or to sell at one of our silent auctions at a future meeting. Keep you eyes out for them!

#### POS MEETINGS CANCELLED FOR MONTHS OF MAY & JUNE

#### **General Meeting Information**

The Palomar Orchid Society regularly meets the FIRST WEDNESDAY of every month at 6:30 pm at the Conference Center at Lake San Marcos (1105 La Bonita Dr., San Marcos, CA 92078).

Traveling on State Route 78, take the Rancho Santa Fe exit and head South. The entrance to the Lake San Marcos Resort is on your left about a 1/4 mile and South of the San Marcos Blvd. intersection. Traveling on I5 South from Oceanside and North Carlsbad, take the Palomar Airport exit and turn right onto Rancho Santa Fe after about 7 miles. Traveling North on I5 from South Carlsbad and Encinitas, for example, take the La Costa Ave. exit and turn left onto Rancho Santa Fe. The entrance to the resort will be the first right after the fire station in San Marcos.

Inside the resort at the first "T" intersection, turn left on San Marino Drive. At the next 4-way STOP, turn right on La Bonita Drive. Proceed ahead for one block on La Bonita. The conference center will be on the left and there is plenty of parking in front.

# **April To Do List**

#### General

• Increases in day length and drastic changes in light levels this month may require repositioning of plants to avoid overexposure to sun. Although cattleyas, dendrobiums and cymbidiums thrive in high light levels, phalaenopisis, miltonopsis, masdevallias and other lower light plants can easily burn. For most orchids, one wants to have light grassy green leaves. Dark green leaves suggest too little light, while yellow colored or red tinted leaves usually indicate too much light.

 $\cdot$  Increasing winds result in additional dust build up on your orchid leaves. This provides the perfect environment for harboring mites. Treat accordingly.

 $\cdot$  As your flower spikes grow taller avoid changing the orchids orientation to the light to avoid flowers being twisted on the stems. For paphs, do not stake to early or the stems will not be as strong and flower will be in "nodding" position.

 $\cdot$  May should be the height of growing and repotting season as new roots emerge from pseudobulbs or fans. Try to repot when roots are small and just beginning to emerge in order to minimize damage to soft tissues and avoid transplant shock, giving plants a head start in the growing season.

• Repot when orchids have begun to over grow their pots and/or when media has started to break down. Also consider repotting plants that have been in pots for 2 or more years and are existing, but not thriving. Repotting can revitalize and provide new vigor to such plants.

 $\cdot$  The repotting process can be overwhelming so set aside plants and repot a few every day to ease the process.

 $\cdot$  As you repot and divide your plants, set aside any extra divisions as donations for the POS auction or for silent auction at the meetings. It will prevent overcrowding of your benches and make someone else happy to get a piece of your prized plant.

· Follow good hygiene practices as outlined last month to minimize transmission of pests and viruses.

 $\cdot$  During warm weather, pests and diseases can proliferate very quickly and spread throughout the collection. Carefully inspect plants and treat early to minimize spread.

• Cautiously use any pesticide, fungicide or chemical. Always use the lowest prescribed dose and avoid spraying flowers and buds unless you are spraying for thrips, since thrips tend to hide in the flowers and crawl into the buds. Recommended dosing for orchids can usually be found on the manufacturer's website. • More details on specific genera can be found on the AOS website and on the St. Augustine Orchid Society website.

#### **Indoors and Greenhouse**

 $\cdot$  Address higher light levels by adding shade cloth or painting with shading compound to avoid burning sensitive plants.

 $\cdot$  Continue to provide good air circulation for indoor plants to discourage diseases and pests such as mealy bugs. Treat early to avoid spreading to other plants.

 $\cdot$  Increase watering and fertilizer to accommodate the growth spurt during this period. Avoid over fertilizing to minimize root damage and growth of soft growths. Keep to one half to one fourth the recommended amount on the package.




